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AMELIE ZEAL

The summer holidays began with a profound shock for our community. We lost Amelie, one of our Year 10 students who was preparing to enter Year 11.

Amelie had been appointed Head Student, a role she thoroughly deserved through her hard work, positivity, and the respect she earned from both staff and peers. Sadly, her illness meant she never had the chance to formally take up the position, but the fact that she was chosen reflects the kind of young person she was and the qualities she brought to our school.

Amelie was often celebrated as an SWR Star on a Friday, whether studying with determination or contributing to school life. She excelled across our community, on the football field, in her dedication to rowing outside of school, and on stage where she sang with confidence and led the band during our end-of-term assembly. Amelie was admired by students and staff alike, a loyal friend, and a true embodiment of our school values of aspiration, collaboration, and resilience.

She was also someone who spoke her mind with honesty and humour. Staff remember her frustration that boys would not let her join their football games at break and lunchtime, although in truth it was probably because she was better than them. That combination of determination, openness, and wit made her stand out even more.

Amelie lived with a sense of adventure and made every day count. At her funeral, we heard about her love of the water, her excitement for surfing, and her dream of one day riding a motorbike, something she thought would be "so much fun." We also learned about her passion for skateboarding, racing down the hill through Nailsworth to meet friends. Even during her illness, Amelie's courage, warmth, and energy continued to shine through, as her family and friends so often said.

Losing someone with such zest for life at such a young age is impossibly cruel. Yet Amelie's legacy will remain with everyone who was fortunate to know her. At the funeral, Mr Farr, Amelie's tutor, spoke of the "Zeal Way," a phrase that perfectly captures her approach to life: positivity, making the most of each day, embracing adventure, laughing often, and supporting others with kindness and loyalty.

At Amelie's funeral, Mia Scanlon and Oren Gibson in Year 11 sang the song Home, a piece of music that held special meaning for her. Mia shared a light-hearted memory from rehearsals in the Music department, when Amelie asked her to sing the male part of the song so that she could practise. She encouraged Mia to "find her inner male voice" to bring it to life, another example of Amelie's humour, warmth, and spirit.

During our whole school assembly we played Home in tribute to Amelie. The song's theme, that "home is wherever I'm with you," symbolises our school community coming together during this sad time. Its uplifting nature also celebrates the energy, joy, and happiness Amelie brought to everyone around her. It reminds us that even in loss, supporting each other creates a sense of home and belonging.

Amelie's parents, Matt and Tara, have embarked on an extraordinary 1,200-mile walk from John O'Groats to Land's End to raise awareness and funds for vital brain tumour research and end-of-life care. They have asked us to share their fundraising page, which provides more information and an opportunity to support their remarkable challenge.
