OFFER OF EARLY HELP

We are a caring, nurturing school and fully understand that family life does not always run smoothly. We recognise that from time to time you may need a little extra support or help. We are committed to the safeguarding of all our children. The purpose of our Early Help Offer is to provide the right kind of support for families at the right time, to achieve change that lasts. We can help you to identify any problems quickly and work with you to prevent the problem reaching crisis point. There are many ways in which we can support you so, if ever things are not right at home, do come and talk to us. We aim to provide support that considers the needs of the whole family.

Children have different Levels of Need at different times across a range of situations. It is important to take all needs into consideration when determining support required and professionals to be involved. The aim of Early Help is to clearly identify when and how children will be supported and safeguarded to ensure their needs are met. Students at Sir William Romney's School benefit from a passionate team of staff who work together to provide the best provision possible. SWR takes responsibility for providing our students and families with level 2 emerging needs/early help provision. This area of support and intervention forms part of our robust pastoral and safeguarding systems.

We have an extensive range of support available in school; Dr P Dillon is our Designated Safeguarding Lead and is supported by Miss M Trowell, as safeguarding officer. Mrs A Jepps and Mr W Ruscoe are our Deputy Safeguarding Leads. Our pastoral system is firmly established and rigorous both in relation to safeguarding and the nurturing support offered to all our pupils and families on a daily basis. Our tutors and Heads of Year are overseen by Mrs L Blake.

In addition, we also have a team of Inclusion Support Workers (ISWs) and School Welfare Officers (SWOs). SWR also employs a school counsellor and works collaboratively with the school nursing team who hold a weekly drop in. Our ISWs work with students on a range of topics. From behaviour, mental health to challenging life experiences. Our SWOs work primarily with children and families who find consistent attendance to school challenging. Referrals to the ISW and SWO teams are made through Mrs Blake and are triaged at our weekly inclusion meetings.

All students received fortnightly Personal Development lessons as part of the curriculum the aim of this is to provide a rich and broad curriculum for learners of all abilities and backgrounds that allows them access to a wide range of issues and topics that empowers them to be agents of change. In turn, they can use their voices effectively and make appropriate informed decisions and choices. Such choices should give students the autonomy and confidence to keep themselves safe, healthy and take into account their roles and responsibilities. The curriculum is designed to meet statutory requirements as well as the needs of our students, informed by student, parental and staff voice and aims to use up to date, relevant resources and address trends in society. This needs to take into account

our rural setting, that is still influenced by the digital and wider world. The curriculum aims to signpost where learners can turn to for support and help when required.

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Personal Development Curriculum

The curriculum has been created as a spiralized curriculum where themes are revisited across the year groups. An example of this is year 7 friendships and positive relationships, revisited in year 8 with consent and positive relationships, revisited in year 9 with STIs and sexual health, revisited in year 10 with the ending of relationships and unhealthy relationships and revisited in year 11 with unwanted attention and violence in relationships. The aim of doing this is strongly linked to schematic learning allowing us to drip feed and develop key messages throughout KS3 and KS4.

The curriculum is designed to meet statutory requirements for SMSC, British Values, RSE, Health and Wellbeing and the emerging needs of our students in order to be able to keep themselves safe and have the knowledge and autonomy of what to do if they feel unsafe. Further to this we have used student voice from the GHLL survey, as well as our own internal survey to help us create our PD curriculum as well as SWR staff and parent surveys around the new RSE guidelines (reviewed every year). This has allowed us to include the expectations set by the Department for Education whilst tailoring the curriculum to the needs of our students. For example, the growing trends linked to knife crime or toxic masculinity.

We are proud to work with external agencies such as Gloucestershire Constabulary who provide sessions for our students through our dedicated school beats officer.

Where appropriate lesson resources will clearly signpost students to where help can be sought if required.

Special Educational Needs

SENDCo – Mrs A Jepps

At Sir William Romney's we believe that all students, irrespective of ability or need, are respected and valued as individuals and this is reflected in all aspects of the school. Students with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are integrated and included fully in the life of the school, including its social and cultural activities. All members of staff have a responsibility to ensure that every student has an equal opportunity to achieve their potential in all aspects of the curriculum. A child or young person will be identified as having an 'SEND' if they have a learning difficulty or

disability which calls for additional educational provision to be made for them. We are aware of the additional vulnerabilities some children, including children with SEND, face. Using a graduated pathway of support, all staff work to enable the progress of students with SEND through a system of waves:

- Wave 1: in-class support, Quality First Teaching
- Wave 2: Targeted intervention in addition to Wave 1 provision
- Wave 3: External specialist intervention
